RWA LONG DISTANCE CHAMPS AND 100 MILES, GARONS PARK, SOUTHEND ON SEA, 2-3 AUGUST

The official results from the English Centurions annual 100 mile qualifying event, which was held three weeks ago at Southend on Sea, are now online, along with the race report (see <u>http://www.centurions1911.org.uk/southend-report---</u>results.html). The report reads as follows

It must be a first... it didn't rain! However, the wind, at times, more than made up for it.....

The general consensus: Southend 100 miles was one of the most successful and enjoyable 100 mile races in recent times. Southend AC, through June Cork, John Brock, Pam Dawson and Ray Pearce, provided competitors, supporters and spectators alike with a good venue, good organisation and a jolly good race. We had the press, BBC East and the Mayor and Mayoress of Southend visit Garon Park over the weekend.

A track 100 miles is not an easy race. Not much by way of changing scenery and you are back where you started some 3 to 4 minutes later. Willpower and the determination to rise to the challenge is what keeps everyone going. Easier said than done. Best intentions are what we all start off with, but sometimes those gremlins get in the way and it is not to be. Still, we all salute all those who didn't make it - for whatever reason. To sign up, start and make the effort is what it is all about.

Richard Gerrard from the Isle of Man was favourite. Richard qualified as a Centurion last year at the Isle of Man 100 miles. He has also had many successes in the prestigious IoM Parish Walk. Richard also qualified as a Continental Centurion in Schiedam (Rotterdam) only seven weeks before the Southend race, as did relative newcomer to ultra race walking, Jayne Farquhar. Amazing on both counts.

Richard went in to the lead from the start and kept it throughout the entire race. Walking wth fellow Isle of Man walker, Vinny - they showed the way for an awful long time. Sandra Brown (Surrey Walking Club) always has to live up the expectation of being favourite in the ladies race. And true to form, she delivered the goods again - and broke the women's age 65 year record as well.

It was good to see a few newcomers to race walking who wanted to take up the challenge of completing 100 miles in 24 hours. Tony Hill and Mark Haynes are welcome additions to the Brotherhood of Centurions. Let's hope they will come back each year and take up new challenges in the race walking calendar. Richard McChesney, already a New Zealand Centurion (a first to have a NZ Centurion in one of our races?) walked consistently throughout and was ably supported by his young son Zac. Then there were the stalwarts - Martin Fisher, Frans Leitjens, Frank van der Gulik, Jaap Visser who seem to like this kind of thing. It was good to see Centurions Robert de Wolf, Sarah Lightman, Chris Cattano also step up for the challenge - again. Other newcomers such as Kim Reed, Martin Payne, Joyce Crawford , came oh so tantalising close to doing it. Please do come back to try again - you won't regret it!

Richard Brown, Chris Flint, Paul King, Olly Brown, Vinny Lynch - all experienced Centurion walkers who sadly had problems on the day - it does happen. So they didn't make the 100 miles this time. Tribute to Chris Flint who was on the organising Committee and had put in an awful lot of time making the race a success - including on the morning of the race - still busy helping set things up and no time to prepare.

It was a good event. Conditions not always easy (despite the lack off rain!) as the temperature did drop considerably through the night.

Overall, 5 new Centurions (C1130-C1134) with 13 of the 26 starters reaching the elusive 100 mile mark.

Sandra Brown (C 36) produced this short report for the Surrey Walking Club Gazette..thanks for passing it on, Sandra.

The 2014 100 miles championship was held at the Garon Park "home" track of Southend AC, and was very successfully organised by the Southend club assisted by SWC Centurion committee members Chris Flint, Kathy Crilley and Pam Ficken.

First home was IOM Veterans Richard Gerrard, C 1106, in 19.36.32. Second overall and 1st lady was SWC's Sandra Brown in 20.40.32, a world record time for the W65 age group. Second lady and 4th overall, well-deserving the "Best performance" award, was Sarah Lightman, Leicester WC, in a new Midlands ladies' record of 22.18.46. Unfortunately SWC's men, Richard Brown and Chris Flint, both ran into problems during the night, and neither completed the 100 on this occasion. Rotterdam's RWV club won the team award.

SWC members who kindly helped during the event included: Pam Ficken [lap recording organisation and team;] Mark Denby [feeding station, one week after his success in the Montane Lakeland 100 miles;] Guy Barnes [lap recording team;] Vicky Barnes/Brown, Shaun and Andrea Lightman.

24 HEURES MARCHE DE WADELINCOURT, WADELINCOURT, BELGIUM, 23-24 AUGUST

Thanks to Emmanuel Tardi for the photos, race report and results from the second edition of the Wadelincourt 24 Hour wal in Belgium. What a high quality event it was with the first 5 men over 198km and Remi Bonnotte 211.782km and Eddy Roze 201.242km staging a huge race. The women's was no less exciting with **Sandra Brown (C 36)** 189.949 winning ahead of Corinne Fauqueue 183.203km. Emmanuel reported:

I was in the small Belgium village of Wadelincourt last Sunday for the first qualification walk for the 2015 Paris-Colmar. The lap was 3.685km long, after an initial shorter lap so that everybody could get a 100km mark on the way through. In the last hour walkers contested a shorter lap of 685m. The temperature was really nice and it was a smooth flat road, except for one small hill.

Eddy Roze and **Remi Bonotte** started together but Eddy cleared out on his own after a few hours, reaching the 50k mark in 4:45 and the 100km in 10:20 (Remi's splits were 4:55 and 10:37). At 3AM, a very strong rain fell for 30 minutes, forcing Eddy Roze to take a significant stop. Remi passed him to take the lead and then kept it to the end despite his own problems in the last 6 hours.

In the women's race, **Sandra Brown** and **Corinne Fauqueur** staged a great battle before Sandra finally broke clear to win, only a few weeks after her victory in the British Centurion qualifying event. There was also an ancillary 6 Hour event with 17 starters (2 teams and 15 individuals). I had gone in Wadelincourt only for pictures and for discussion, but I eventually entered in the race and walked for a little while.

The following short report was prepared for the Surrey Walking Club Gazette. It reads like this

The village of Wadelincourt, not far from the Belgian/French border, hosted the first Paris-Colmar qualifying event of the 2014-15 season. SWC's Sandra Brown and Kathy Crilley, veterans of many such continental walking races, decided to give this relatively new event a try, en route visiting the historic town of Tournai, whose Romanesque cathedral and bell tower are designated a World Heritage Site. The organising team were delighted to have two English walkers to enhance the international character of the event, and were very welcoming and hospitable. The race was well organised, with the event HQ, athletes and supporters "village", and refreshments near Wadelincourt's village hall, and a second feeding station on the rural circuit of nearly 3.7 kms. Belgian and French judges and officials provided a strong presence throughout the event.

Although the field for this relatively new and little-known race was not large, the walkers were inspired to give their best efforts. The first three men to finish completed over 200 kms in 24h. SWC's ladies gave commendable performances. Sandra was 6th overall and first lady with a W65 24h World Record distance of 189.949 kms. This distance exceeds by some way the W65 running world record! Kathy completed a strong 132.558 kms for 4th lady and 15th place overall. But for the thunderstorm and torrential rain which drove walkers off the circuit for some minutes during the night, both ladies would have achieved even greater distances.

The Belgians take their beer very seriously indeed, and all prizes took the form of local brew, with which our ladies nobly struggled home on Eurostar after the race. The event will be biennial, and deserves better support in future years. Kathy and Sandra give the event their personal recommendation!

RUDY AND CAROLINE WALK 'THROUGH THE FLANDERS FIELDS

Thanks to **Rudy Schoors (C 55)** and **Caroline Mestdagh (C 56)** for this great piece about their most recent Belgian walk. I am just to jealous of the many fine walking opportunities on the continent and in England. Here in Australia we are just so sparsely served by such things.

After we walked the March of Death at Bornem, we fronted up again last weekend for a further 100 km walk. To commemorate the 100th anniversary of the Great War, the NVV association organised a unique event for hikers: a Memorial March called *Through Flanders Fields*.

The 100 km walk started at Torhout and forward to Vladslo - Diksmuide - Ieper - Zonnebeke - Passendale and finished again at Torhout. The hike focused on the beautiful landscape between Torhout and Diksmuide before aiming at the silent witnesses of the Great War in and around Ypres. The weather was much better than we had at Bornem. Mild temperatures and no rain this time. It was a walk to remember. Towards Diksmuide we walked many kilometres along the river IJzer, an important river during WWI. At Diksmuide we could admire the AVV-VVK tower: this tower is 84m high and a memorial monument for the fallen Flemish soldiers during the First World War. At the four sites of the tower are the words: *No more war, Nooit meer oorlog, Plus jamais de guerre, Nie wieder krieg.* All in the language of the fighting sides.

At Ieper we walked through the Menengate, also a memorial monument, build by the British ro commemorate

the fallen British soldiers who couldn't be identified or were never found back on the front until 15 August 1917. The names of 54,896 British are written in this monument. Since 1928, every evening at 8 o'clock the last post resounds in this immense bow. A very emotional moment. We both have seen it many times and every time we are impressed by this.

At Tyne Cot Cemetery at Passendale we passed another place in memory of the British unknown soldiers. Here the names are written at a wall since 16 August 1917, 34,957 in total. Tyne Cot is the greatest military cemetery of fallen British soldiers on the European mainland. From Passendale we walked to the finish with the abomination of this war in our minds.

Hopefully the other 460 walkers enjoyed this special walk as much as we did and will remember the soldiers who has fallen for the well-being of us.

In my last newsletter, I published the combined 24 Hour distances for those mighty ones amongst us who have both run and walked one hundred miles within 24 hours. Ian Valentine suggested I take a different view and calculate the combined time for their respective 100 mile run and 100 mile walk efforts. Your wish is my command, Ian. I have been able to source run times for everyone except for Sandra Brown and Lyn Lewis. Here is how it looks:

Sandra ran 215.093km in 1993. I would estimate a 100 mile split of around 16:30 to 17:00. That would give her a total time of around 1 day 11 hours and put her right up around second or third spot behind Yiannis Kouros. I am still waiting for a definitive answer. Sandra commented: *Interesting question! I'll see what I have. It will depend on whether 100 miles times were taken during 24h events. Only a few countries - you, we, USA, Dutch - have this bizarre interest in 160.9kms!*

Lyn wasn't able to find the 100 mile split from either of her hundred runs. She emailed me to say: I don't think I have the 100mile time that I did on the track, only the 100 mile at Glasshouse which would be slow because of the hills and rough terrain. The track race I did was also very rough being grass and around the outside of a football oval. It also rained the whole 24hours and we ended up running in mud.
