ST THIBAULT DE VIGNES, 24H WALK, ST THIBAULT DE VIGNES, FRA, OCT 7-8, 2017

Emmanuel Tardi was at the St Thibault de Vignes 24 Hours Walking race in France in early October. This is one of 5 qualifying opportunities (there were supposed to be six qualifiers but the first one was cancelled) for next year's Paris-Alsace classic

The event was held on a cycle path in the local park in St Thibault de Vignes, a city some 32km east of Paris. The first lap was 2.043km, followed by laps of 2.226km (to allow for an exact number of laps at the 100 km mark), before dropping down to a smaller 1.223km lap for the last hour. The weather was cloudy with some rain, dropping to 0°C overnight.

The men's race was very competive, with the lead changing a number of times. As usual, **Eddy Roze** led out before stopping at the 7 hour mark. This left Belgian **Daniel Lhoest** in the lead but he was forced to stop at 3AM with back issues. From there, local walker **Patrick Langlois** took over the lead, but he was forced out at 6AM with his own issues. Thus **Saadi Lougrada** looked to have victory in his grasp, entering the last hour some 3km ahead of **Pascal Thevenin**. But nothing is certain in such races, as Lougrada slowed and slowed, while Thevenin walked faster and faster. When the final gun sounded, nobody knew which of the two had won, and it was not until 30 minutes later that the judges had finished the measurements and announced that Thevenin had secrured the victory by 285m from Lougrada. In the women's race, it was more straightforward, with **Christine David** leading the whole way to finish fifth overall with a distance of 151.680km.

12 / 24 / 48 HEURES DE ROYAN, ROYAN, FRANCE, 6-8 OCTOBER 2017

Amazingly, the ultra walk in St Thibault des Vignes was only one of two such events in France on that same weekend. If you fancied a trip to the French seaside, then the seaside resort city of Royan was just the place to be, as their annual 48 Hour / 24 Hour / 12 Hour ultra distance run/walk event was played out (see http://100km.iroyan.com/). There were good numbers in the walk divisions, with the 48 Hour walk being won by last year's second placed **Dominique Delange** (281.533km). The 24 Hour walk was won by **Gerard Duran** with 169.333km (that's over 100 miles for us centurion oriented persons). Sadly, the French do not acknowledge the significance of the 100 mile mark (160.934km) and do not have their own centurion chapter. Thus the performances of people like Gerard do not get their full recognition. The 12 Hour walk was won by **Alain Bougnard** with 88.185km.

SRI CHINMOY NZ 24 HOUR CHAMPIONSHIPS, AUCKLAND, NZ, OCT 7-8, 2017

And keeping with the ultra walking theme, that same weekend also saw the annual New Zealand Centurions qualifying race, held in Auckland in conjunction with the Sri Chinmoy New Zealand 24 Hour Championships.

Thanks to New Zealand Centurions Secretary Philip Sharp for the following report

The 2017 New Zealand Centurion Qualifier was held October 7 and 8 at Sovereign Stadium, Auckland, as part of the 20th Sri Chinmoy 6-12-24 track races and 12-hour teams relay. The rain lasted 14 hours, which is longer

than it normally does for this event. Otherwise the weather was typical with an overnight low of 13 degrees and a nearby thunderstorm.

Eight walkers entered the 24 hour race. John Kilmartin did not start because of a quad injury. This left Gertrude Achterberg (W45), Trudy Geldhof (W45), Marco Bloemerts (M50), Arie Kandelaars (M50), Antoine Hunting (M45), Rob Robertson (M50) and Damien Wood (M40). The first five were from the Netherlands, Rob was from the US, and Damien from New Zealand. Going into the race, Rob had five centurion designations, Antoine 4, Gertrude 3, Arie and Marco 2 each. Damien had not competed in a centurion qualifier but he had run ultras.

The race started at 9:11am in good weather. Gertrude led off, followed by Arie, Marco, Antoine, and Damien (see photo below). Rob and Trudy were a little back. After several laps Antoine made a brief stop to adjust a belt and took the opportunity to reduce his speed a bit. Nothing untoward happened in the first six hours except Rob developed a distinct lean to the left. This was taken just after the walkers changed direction at the four-hour mark. I asked Rob if he was okay and he said he was.

After 6 hours 30 Gertrude, Arie, Damien had covered 48 km, Marco 47, Antoine and Rob 46, and Trudy 45.

Ninety minutes later, Antoine was out of the race because of shin splints in his left leg, leaving six in the race. Soon it was five with Trudy retiring after 8½ hours. She thought she would not have enough time to complete the 100 miles in the 24 hours. Antoine and Trudy both completed 58.4 kms.

The rain started nine hours into the race. The rain was not heavy but was a nuisance because despite \$30,000 worth of remedial work, water still does not drain from lane 1 on the Sovereign track. An hour after the rain started, Marco asked me how long it was going to rain. I said, with more confidence than could be justified, "All night". Marco donned his raincoat.

At the $10\frac{1}{2}$ hour mark, Gertrude was on 77 kms, Arie, Marco and Damien on 76 kms, and Rob on 74 kms. Two and a half hours later Getrude was on 92 kms, Marco 91 kms, Arie who had an upset tummy on 90 kms, and Rob 88 kms. Gertrude reached 100 km at 14:07, followed by Marco, Arie and Rob. By now Damien had slowed considerably.

I completed my first session of judging after 17¼ hours at around 2:30am. My partner Elizabeth Mead assumed the judging duties while I had some sleep. When I went to bed, Marco was still on his 3:20 laps, Gertrude and Arie were walking steadily but had slowed a bit, and Damien was off the track.

The first thing I did when I arose just after 6am was to count the number of walkers on the track. I knew Damien might be off the track and was surprised to see just three walkers circling. Where was Rob? I was told he was in the kitchen of the millennium building beside the track. I walked up to the kitchen and found Rob lying on the floor and his wife Brenda with him. I quickly decided Rob was suffering from mild hypothermia. I had brought spare clothes to the race for the walkers. Brenda and I put these to good use.

I left Brenda to it and went back to the track. Gertrude, Arie and Marco had slowed but I was sure they would make 100 miles unless they had a medical difficulty. And that's what happened. Marco reached 100 miles in 22:43:30, followed by Gertrude in 23:29:45 and Arie in 23:36:29.

Marco continued walking and reached 169.331 kms in 24 hours. Gertrude and Arie stopped immediately after reaching the 100 miles. I suggested they do two more laps in case their laps had been miscounted. This rarely happens with the Sri Chinmoy races but it does happen and I always recommend walkers (and runners) do two more laps once they reach their goal. Gertrude and Arie took my advice and walked to 161.600 kms.

I looked in on Rob about one hour after leaving him. He was sitting up against the wall in the kitchen and wearing some "mostly dry" clothes of his Brenda had found. One hour was a fast recovery and indicates his hypothermia was mild. When I check on him a further hour later, he and Brenda had returned to their accommodation.

That left Damien. Much to his credit he did not retire from the race. Instead he used a mix of walking and naps in a chair to keep himself going. When the 24 hours was up he had walked 115.625 kms.

This qualifier was one of our most successful qualifiers. I am always grateful that Sri Chinmoy permit us to hold the qualifier as part of their annual event. I would like to thank Elizabeth Mead who did part of the graveyard shift of judging.

WOW what a race in Auckland. I have been VERY lucky to have done five Centurion races. Well, now I have seen the other side of a Centurion race. The side where you have to swallow your pride and bale. One challenge in any long race is figuring splits in your head. I knew I needed 3:55 splits to make centurion the last six hours. When I crossed the mat with a 4:10 lap, I knew I didn't have a 3:40 in me. You can't play that game for five hours. I pulled the plug. Where did I go wrong? Training was good. Slept each night before the race. Mentally tough. I have experience. It was not my day. It was an honor to watch my Dutch Friends Marco, Arie and Gertrude walk a tough race. It rained for 14 hours, almost half that time sideways due to the wind. They earned their New Zealand Centurion badges. Congratulations! So sad to watch Antoine, Trudy and Damien struggle like me.

After I threw in the towel, to say I was in a bad way is an gross understatement. I had mild hypothermia. Thanks to Phillip Sharp who saved me a trip to the hospital. Thanks to my wife Brenda who feed me porridge like I was a little baby violently shaking on the floor. My granddaughter is going to love that photo. Back at our B&B now. Can't sleep. Can't eat.

Whats next? Think I will take up ping pong.

AFRICAN CENTURION 2017, ROBBEN ISLAND, CAPE TOWN, SOUTH AFRICA, 21-22 OCTOBER

Fast forward two weeks for the second annual African Centurions 100 Mile Walk qualifier which proved just as successful as last year's event which saw an inaugural 19 qualifiers. This year's 100 mile walk was held in the same venue, namely Robben Island, Cape Town. The first lap took in 6.8 miles (11km) of Robben Island's incredible

scenery, including a sweeping stretch of wild Atlantic coastline. Thereafter, walkers settled into a 4.4-mile (7km) loop that wound through the forested ground and the village housing those who work on the island. Overall, 22 laps were required to complete the 100 miles. Ten walkers were up to the task, led by Isle of Man walkers **Robbie Callister** (2:33:44) and **Andrew Titley** (21:51:24). The 2 IOM finishers were joined by 5 Belgians, 2 South Africans and one Dutch walker. Husband and wife team **Rudy Schoors** (22:47:08) and **Caroline Mestdagh** (22:47:06) each completed their 6th centurion badge, joining Jill Green in that elite group and only 1 badge behind the great Sandra Brown who leads the pack with all 7 possible badges. South African **Hilton Murray** (22:58:17) got a special cheer as he crossed the finish line, becoming a local African Centurion. Overall, badges AC20-29 were awarded.

A special note for Australian readers – it was great to see Australian **Geoff Hain (C49)** in action. Geoff, who has 5 centurion badges to his credit, returned after some 10 years away from the sport, finishing 10th with 117.5 km.

Great effort from the Belgian team at the second Centurion in South Africa. Five Belgians started the race and all five achieved the South African Centurion title. Two got even on the podium: Caroline became the first lady and Kim Janssens finished in the third place at the men's category.

We stayed another couple of days in Cape town to explore the region and had a fantastic time with our Belgian friends.

24 HEURES D'ALBI, ALBI, FRANCE, 21-22 OCTOBER

The French city of Albi, some 500m south of Paris, held its annual 24 Hour race which was well supported, with 50 finishers in the 24H run and 7 finishers in the 24H walk. FRENCH 100KM ROADWALK CHAMPIONSHIPS, CORCIEUX, FRANCE, SUNDAY 29 OCTOBER

Emmanuel Tardi was in Corcieux, in eastern France, on Sunday 29th October for the French 100km National Championships. It was a long day with the 100km (time limit 14 hours) starting at midnight, ancillary 50km races (time limit 6 hours) starting at 8AM and ancilliary 20km races (time limit 3 hours) starting at 11AM. The races were held on a 1km lap in the central city area and Emmanuel was chief judge. He reports as follows

12 walkers were on the 100km start line at midnight but unfortunately the weather was very very bad, with very strong winds and cold rain staying for the entire race. **Cedric Varain** led from start to finish, winning with a time of 11:30:48. **David Vandercoilden** was close behind was unfortunately disqualified after 63km. The minor placings were decided with a sprint in the final km, with **Rene Serrano** (12:54:06) finishing just ahead of **Mickael Jacquemin** (12:56:11).

In the men's 50km, the 3 walkers started fast, with the first 5km covered in 25:40. But the weather eventually took its toll with two retiring and the only finisher **Raymond Fauqueue** slowing as the race progressed. The women's 50km saw a very healthy field of 6 walkers, with the youngest **Morgane Ausello** (born in 1992) eventually winning. She started carefully in 4th place but walked very evenly, eventually taking the lead around the 20km mark. At the 42km mark, we heard her coach saying "you can go now" and she then sped off, finishing in a time of 5:32:04, after a strong negative split. It 's a pity the weather was so bad. She can probably reach the 5 hour mark very soon.

MKH KAJANG INTERNATIONAL 12 HOUR WALK 2017, KAJANG, MALAYSIA, 11-12 NOVEMBER

Justin and Sharon Scholz (61 and C63) were in action in this year's Malaysian 12 Hour Walk, held in Kajang in mid November. And they scooped the pool, winning their respective divisions with some fine walking. Justin reported as follows

Justin and Sharon Scholz have again been in action at an international event this year. After a disappointing 24 Hour World Championships outing for Sharon in July, the Scholz team mounted an assault on China and Malaysia in recent weeks and managed to win outright at the Malaysian 12 hour international walk in Kajang, Kuala Lumpur.

"It was great to get a win in Malaysia," said Justin. "I've been focusing on winning this event since about June and have trained well. I had some calf and shin issues in the two weeks leading in which made me a bit nervous. Fortunately, I worked through those and was feeling good within a couple of hours of the event starting."

Justin, first placed of all 400 entrants in the 12 hour event, managed a final distance of 102km. With a comfortable margin over second placed Peter Black from Singapore and Malaysia's Mark Yong Leong, Justin reduced the pace at the 9 hour mark.

"Though there was a lap display, it didn't include the athletes position in the field. I asked a lady to check my position for me at 9 hours, and if I was in front then by how much. When informed that I was seven laps (seven kilometres) in front of second I decided that the win was more important than anything else and so backed off the pace to avoid any possible injury issues. I wouldn't have been able to sustain the pace I was at anyway and it hurts too much to keep up a high intensity. So, it suited me fine to know that I could afford to back it off a bit."

Just seven days after participating in a 24 hour invitational running race in China, Sharon also managed a win in the 12 hour event with 92km. This bettered Hong Kong athlete Ng Peng Hoon's 79km who in turn led home a close field for the minor places. Malaysia's Tan Boon Gaik was third with 78km, ahead of China's So Kit Sum on 77km.

"I had issues in China similar to those I experienced in Belfast in July and only managed 127 kilometers before I needed to withdraw. Training had generally been OK with some good weeks of running at and over 200km in preparation. With very high temperatures and humidity, and on a concrete course with lots of direction changes, the China event was always going to be tough. But I was ready for that and thus disappointed that internal issues which I can't avoid got in the way. Though I was entered for the Malaysian walk event, I had no expectations at all. This was Justin's focus event and I was meant to be there for participation only. But the China failure got me revved up a bit and because my muscular and cardio systems were fine I decided to have a serious go at doing well. Very stoked with the win against quality international competition."

Not only did Justin and Sharon each win 2000 Malaysian Ringgits (\$650) for their victories in the 12 hour event, they also each collected the 1000 Ringgits prize for the fastest 50 kilometer time along the way.

"I'm not competitive at the short end of race walking," said Justin. "As such I was shuffled back to about 12th male at the start and figured that I'd slowly gain on those in front as the time went on, but not before the 50 kilometer point. As I started passing entrants and doing the math though, I figured by three hours I must be pretty close to the front. With over 400 people on a one kilometre course it was hard to be sure, but I felt good and decided to just go for it. Eventually I passed the 50 kilometer mark in 5 hours 33 minutes which is a nice personal best for me."

Sharon managed 6 hours 14 minutes for her 50 kilometers.

"Like Justin, I just went for it. We figured that if we fell apart in the extreme humidity then at least we'd have something to show for it. Fortunately, we stayed strong and built a buffer after the six hours mark which allowed us to slow down and walk together for a couple of hours at the end."

In an Aussie clean sweep, the Scholz duo and shared the 1000 Ringgits prize for top team.

"Organisers invited us to a pre-event dinner the night before the event," said Justin. "Most of the competitive internationals were there and with the blessing of event organisers we were allowed to form a team which we named the 'International All Stars'. Sharon was the minimum one female in the team of four, and to this we added the services of Akihiro Sugimoteo from Japan and Leung Tin Kin from Hong Kong to form our team.

Both Leung (83km) and Akihiro (75km) walked personal best distances to help us claim the win with a team total of 350 kilometers."

The second placed team 'World Masters Racewalkers' started strongly, but generally faded as the event continued due to their shorter distance credentials. With 332 kilometers they were well ahead of third placed Hong Kong walkers with 282 kilometers.

"Yes, if the team event stopped at 20 (kilometres) then we'd have been beaten by a long way," said Justin. "Patience and persistence is the key to long ultras and both Sharon and I were really pleased with the tenacity shown by our new international friends Akihiro and Leung. Those guys really suffered as they weren't going to let the team down. With only four members in any team it's important that the lowest distance completed of the four is still solid," he said.

Such is the nature of ultra running and walking that Justin and Sharon are already preparing for events in 2018. "I'd like to get a decent 24 hour run result under my belt again soon," said Sharon. "So my focus now is the 24 hour in Canberra in March. I'll do some other shorter ultras as training before then, but Canberra is the main future goal."

"And I've got the 240 kilometer Coast to Kosciuszko in under three weeks," added Justin. "That's a big event for our family each year and I'm keen to do well. But my main focus now is the 24 hour in Coburg in April where I'm unashamedly aiming to break the National 24 hour walk record of 196 kilometers set by Jim Gleeson in 1971. When you break that down it's a massive undertaking, but I'm keen to give it a shot."
